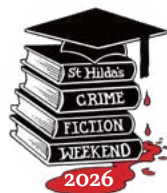

From Brer Rabbit to Tom Ripley: Anti-heroes in children's books and crime novels

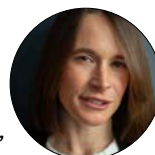


Not quite villains but not good guys either, anti-heroes are an unsettling bunch with an unusually powerful hold on our imaginations. In the murky world of crime they seem naturally at home. But they pop up in all sorts of fiction, even in stories for the youngest readers, and a comparison of anti-heroes of children's books with those in crime novels may be useful in flushing out the deep-lying ambiguities that make them so unforgettable.

That isn't an anti-hero, that's a villain with style

Examining evidence from *Paradise Lost* to *Breaking Bad*, Abigail will question whether there is any substantive definition to being an anti-hero, or whether anti-heroes are, in fact, just charismatic villains, and often great orators.

Roll out the Barrel

The last fifty years have seen an increasing number of thrillers featuring AI and technology as the central threat to humanity, including *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep* (Philip K Dick) *The Fear Index* (Robert Harris) and more recently, *Eden Falls* (Ajay Chowdhury). Jo Callaghan explores how the very best of crime fiction recognises what B.F. Skinner once observed: 'The mystery which surrounds a thinking machine already surrounds a thinking man.' AI in crime novels offers a powerful new lens on perennial issues, and an inconvenient reminder that although 'one bad apple spoils the barrel' the problem is not the single apple but the barrel they inhabit.

From fingerprints to firewalls: The changing role of technology in crime writing

Technology has always been woven into crime fiction: from Holmes's early scientific reading of the crime scene, through Scarpetta's forensic toolkit, to today's algorithmic surveillance and AI-driven policing. Whether it's weaponised to conceal a crime or harnessed to expose the truth, crime writers have often been among the first to explore the possibilities of technology. This talk surveys how tech has evolved on the page, when it strengthens a story (and when it overwhelms it), and where the genre may be heading next.

Crime fiction's monstrous mothers

"We are all of us...drawn to monsters." So intones writer Aggie Wiggs in Netflix's recent *The Beast in Me*. But what happens when the monster is a mother? Or when a mother is - if not outright monstrous - then highly problematic, at best? If crime fiction allows us to explore the darkest parts of the human psyche then it's also a fertile area for exploring taboo-busting anti-heroines who are more than ambivalent about having given birth.

“We are not so different, you and I”: George Smiley and his black grail

Ever since Mary Shelley and Conan-Doyle, authors have embraced the dark mirror: a hero and villain who reflect one another, adding dimension and character layers to both. Nobody does this better than John Le Carré in his original Karla trilogy, a cat-and-mouse battle of the psyche between MI5 agent, George Smiley and his Russian counterpart, Karla. Laura will examine the ways in which Le Carré uses hero and villain to explore one another and inform plot, with additional reference to other classic mirror pairings, such as Holmes and Moriarty, Nick and Amy Dunne, and Hannibal Lecter and Clarice Starling.

Victims and villains: Depictions of women in historical true crime

In conversation with Carolyn Kirby, Hallie Rubenhold will examine the ways in which women are depicted in accounts of historical true crimes, from the victims of Jack the Ripper to Ethel Le Neve, Dr Crippen's accomplice in the murder of Belle Elmore, acquitted of murder and of being an accessory after the fact, but almost certainly guilty of the crime.

The Ashe-Pitt, a hotch-potch of a museum in Oxford, is hosting a film fan convention.

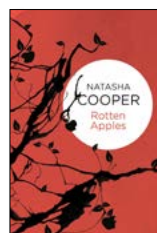


Ajay Chowdhury

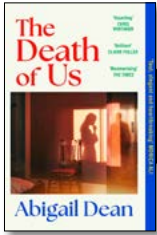


Natasha Cooper

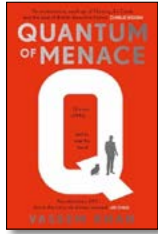

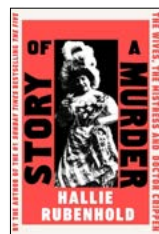
Remi Kone Saturday | Session 1

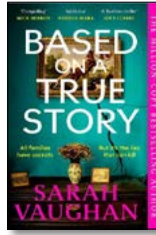




Laura Shepherd-Robinson Sunday | Session 4

St Hilda's alumna Jean Buchanan is co-founder with Eileen Roberts of the Crime Fiction Weekend, which began in 1994 with 'Women Crime Writers'. Jean is mostly a scriptwriter. She created and wrote many episodes of the children's tv sitcoms *The Wild House* (BBC, series 3 short-listed for a British Comedy Award) and *Welcome to Orty-Fou* (ITV). Her first foray into TV was a play, *The Princess and the Lute-Player*, for the series *Jackanory Playhouse*. Jean tackled crime with her Radio 4 dramatisation of David Dodge's 1952 novel *To Catch a Thief*, the book behind the iconic Hitchcock film, and tracked down Dodge's small rented villa on the Riviera for a tie-in Radio 4 Arts feature, *In Search of the Villa Noel Fleuri*, written up for Kindle as *Mr Dodge, Mr Hitchcock, and the French Riviera*. She used to work for Oxford University Press on the revision of OED and on quotations dictionaries, and began her writing career in the traditional way, with short stories in magazines.

Mick Herron is a bestselling and award-winning novelist and short story writer, best known for his *Slow Horses* thrillers. Raised in Newcastle upon Tyne, Mick studied English Literature at Oxford, where he continues to live. He was awarded the Theakstons Crime Novel of the Year 2022 for *Slough House*, the seventh book in the series. Mick has also won the CWA Steel, Gold and Diamond daggers.
