This is a special time for the JdP Music Building. September 2025 is its 30th anniversary; in the coming season we are slowly building up to to this point through a series of concerts focussing on the cello, starting with Florian Berner's baroque recital in September 2024. Its key highlights include Natalie Clein's concert and cello masterclass on September 21st 2025, as well as the two recitals given by St Hilda's College Honorary Fellow Steven Isserlis in February and November 2025. It also presents a survey of some of the greatest chamber repertoire the cello has inspired – the Ravel and Kodály duos for violin and cello, Brahms's Clarinet Trio and Schubert's famous String Quintet.

As part of the first of a cycle of Villiers Quartet concerts devoted to Late Schubert, the aforementioned quintet will feature the playing of St Hilda's second-year cellist, Ollie Simpson. In fact, each concert will feature a collaboration with one of our outstanding student performers and composers (Ariana Pethard, Jaren Ziegler, Alexander McNamee). The Villiers Quartet will also profile the work of 20th and 21st century women composers, reflecting the JdP's advocacy across the whole season (Tansy Davies, Sally Beamish, Elizabeth Maconchy, Asha Parkinson).

There are several other notable innovations in this year's season. First, you'll notice in the brochure our 'Tantalising Tuesday' series: we've found that focusing on Tuesdays gives us the flexibility to bring more extraordinary concerts to Oxford audiences, as shown by the Steven Isserlis, Gottlieb Wallisch and Asha Parkinson concerts that fall on this day.

A special series of ten early music concerts also takes place on Tuesdays in the JdP's sister venue, St Giles' Chapel. The chapel's intimate space, beautiful acoustic and quiet setting enables us to profile early music repertoire for the most magical of instruments – the clavichord, the lute, viola da gamba, the harpsichord, the guitar – and work closely with some of the UK's most exciting period practice performers – Sergio Bucheli, Julian Perkins, Intesa, Sirinu.

The coming season also features four jazz concerts headlined by pianists Gwilym Simcock and Zoe Rahman, an extended January New Music Weekend focussing on improvised music and dance, as well as Maki Sekiya's exciting Tête-à-Tête series in which composers present the classical and romantic piano repertoire that most influences them.





Transitioning between pieces from distant origins (dance music, songs about love, and tales of migration), Intesa creates connections through common emotion, narrative, and sound in a programme that starts in early morning and ends in the dead of night.

AELITA QUEEN OF MARS

silent film with music by Juliet Merchant

This is a rare showing of Protazanov's silent film, based on a 1923 novella by Aleksey N. Tolstoy and accompanied by a live musical score created by Oxford-based film composer, Juliet Merchant. The extraordinary imagery of this film and its science fiction content resonates strongly with film noir and with the work of future filmmakers such as Tarkovsky, Hitchcock and Lynch. This film also casts an interesting light on the Bolshevik Revolution, having been filmed almost contemporaneously with the publication of Lenin's New Economic Policy (NEP), which supported space exploration as a way of developing a new utopian society.



17:15 Lecture

RAISING ONE'S VOICE

the political-social works of composer Eugene Birman

This lecture by the Latvian-born composer Eugene Birman charts a course through his daring and often controversial vocal and operatic works, confronting Russian aggression, the post-Soviet identity (and border) crises, as well as the European Union's own broken promises in the context of human rights and civil society. The lecture examines the earlier choral work '289' (2014), which set to music the words of a League of Nations treaty on the border between the Soviet Union and Estonia. He also introduces his Guggenheim-awarded 'Russia: Today' (2020), shown immediately after the lecture.





18:30 Film Showing

RUSSIA: TODAY

by Eugene Birman and Scott Diel

This season we are delighted to bring back by popular demand the remarkable film of Eugene Birman's documentary opera 'Russia: Today', with kind permission from the composer and producer Tonya Wechsler. The story of how this film was made is alone remarkable. In response to a commission from the English choir EXAUDI, Eugene Birman and his librettist Scott Diel undertook around 125 interviews with members of the public in Moscow, Vladivostok, Riga, Helsinki and a host of other countries close to Russia in 2018 and 2019. The interviewees were asked for their thoughts about Russia's identity, particularly in relation to its former status as the central part of the Soviet Union. This happened at a time when Russia was seeking to expand its borders again, as shown by what happened in Crimea in 2014. These testimonies were translated and reordered to form a 70-minute choral work, punctuated by some of the recordings of the interviewees' responses. 'Russia: Today' also plays on the idea of a traditional Russian Orthodox panikhida, a form of requiem prayer for the soul after death. When the pandemic struck in 2020, a film version of the work was made using natural imagery of Russia by Alexandra Karelina, with music recorded by the Latvian ensemble Argentum. The film, premiered in Vladivostok in 2021, has become all the more hard-hitting for the light it throws on Putin's subsequent invasion of Ukraine in 2022.

RUSSIAN IDENTITY AND THE CONSTRUCTION OF MEMORY Jade McGlynn and Eugene Birman

This discussion is an opportunity to consider RUSSIA: TODAY in the light of current events, drawing both on Eugene Birman's lecture on his work at 5.15pm and on ideas drawn from Jade McGlynn's recent books on Russian identity. A graduate of Oxford University and a leading broadcaster commenting on Russia and the Ukrainian War, Jade McGlynn is the author of *Memory Makers: The Politics of the Past in Putin's Russia* (2023) and *Russia's War* (2023).

Egon Wellesz (1885-1974): Der Abend, op. 4 **Arnold Schoenberg (1874-1951)**: Three Piano Pieces, op. 11 **Wilhelm Grosz (1894-1951)**: Symphonic Variations, op. 9

Gottlieb Wallisch's recital commemorates the 150th anniversary of Schoenberg's birth as well as the work of his student Egon Wellesz, who died in Oxford 50 years ago. The fin-de-siecle impressionism of Wellesz' cycle 'Der Abend' (1909/10) is contrasted with Wilhelm Grosz's Symphonic Variations, op. 9 from 1920: a monumental piece that combines a post-Mahlerian musical language with highly virtuosic pianism. This recital is presented in association with the Faculty of Music and the UdK Berlin [Universität der Künste Berlin].

Jonathan has been a featured artist over the past decade, in which time he has given extraordinary performances of music by Scriabin, Shostakovich, Messiaen, Stockhausen, Sylvestrov, Winterberg and Ulmann, among many others. During this time the recording he made here of Sorabji's massive 'Sequencia Cyclica' won the Deutsche Schallplattenpreis in 2020. Tonight's concert presents a characteristically revelatory mixture of forgotten Romantic piano treasures, with a particular highlight being Egon Kornauth's breathtaking Phantasie, op. 10.

Asha Parkinson's wonderful Kalpadruma Ensemble is a filmic global 14-piece studio orchestra bringing together jazz quintet, string quartet, woodwind, voice and the distinctive sound of the qanun playing powerfully melodic, rhythmically sophisticated, often groove-based material. Asha's vibrant, genrebusting second album, Possession, blurs the boundaries between Jazz, Contemporary Classical, Flamenco, Mediterranean and Arab



musics to find its own unique, deeply resonant voice. Subjects range from obsessive love to urban trance to mystical inspiration to devotion and beyond.

THE LORD OF MISRULE: A Medieval Christmas Concert

Sirinu invite you to experience the pre-reformation Christmas with music from the English popular carol tradition. The Christmas period – from the appointment of the Lord of Misrule to Epiphany – was celebrated with an elaborate series of feasts and ceremonies in late medieval England and abroad. By the fifteenth century men wearing monkish habits chose a lunatic fellow to parade as 'Lord of Misrule' and commemorated the 'Feast of Fools' with street plays. In today's concert we mark this by interspersing festive English songs of the period with selections from the Piae Cantiones collection from 1582, from which so many of our modern day carols are taken.

We are delighted to host Oxford-based pianist Maki Sekiya's new Tête-à-Tête with Composers series in the coming years. Maki, who is affiliated with Green Templeton College, is an insightful and beguiling interpreter of the classical and romantic piano repertoire, with a specific interest in contemporary music. In each of her Tête-à-Tête programmes, Maki invites a composer to present their own works for piano alongside the music that most inspired them, to form a kind of pianistic 'Private Passions' recital. The first of these concerts focusses on the work of composer Jeremy Arden, who celebrates his 60th birthday this year. Schillinger's music features in the programme and Jeremy has kindly offered to give a pre-concert talk focussing on the Schillinger System of Musical Composition at 6.30pm, something that should be of great interest to composers and theorists alike.

The JdP Music Building is available to hire for a wide range of events including concerts, recordings, rehearsals, drama productions, lectures, meetings, conferences and other functions. The Edward Boyle auditorium seats 168 people and its raised stage provides all audience members with an excellent view. It offers a first-class acoustic, ideal for chamber music but also for the spoken voice. We can host classical, jazz, folk and other types of concerts. The auditorium is a very versatile space with fully adjustable seating and acoustics, enabling it to function successfully as a venue for concerts, recordings, lectures, conferences, and dramatic productions. The low level of background noise, the Steinway D piano, and a wall box connection to the recording studio make it an ideal space for musical performance and recordings, while the built-in PA system and data projector also make the auditorium well-suited to hosting conferences.

PRACTICE ROOMS

The JdP has four practice rooms available to hire. Each room has a piano, piano stool, chairs and music stands. All rooms can be used for individual practice or teaching.

The Lee Room contains two upright pianos, which suits piano teaching, duo work and individual practice. The Salmon Room contains one upright piano and is the ideal space for individual practice. The Mackinnon Room contains a Yamaha U3 SH piano, which enables students and teachers to play the piano silently, record their playing or use the built-in electronic samples. This room is also acoustically treated, making it an ideal practice space for all instruments. The Stevenson Room is larger than the upstairs practice spaces and has a Steinway A grand piano. It is designed to be a practice facility for professional pianists, small chamber groups and advanced piano teaching. It is also used as a green room for concerts and events.

Oxford Improvisers are one of the UK's premiere free improvisation groups, having been established in 2001 to continue the work of the Oxford Improvisers' Collective in the 1980s. Committed to principles of diversity, the group strives to allow each participant to bring their own tapestry of musical heritage and persuasions to bear, promoting an enjoyment of creative music making in the moment.



This concert focusses on the chamber music repertoire that emerged after Brahms's Clarinet Trio op. 114 was premiered in 1891. Eusebius Mandyczewski commented on that occasion that 'it [was] as though the instruments were in love with each other', and a group of composers creating music in Brahms's wake immediately gravitated to composing for clarinet, cello and piano. Yet there is also a darker subtext to this concert. Two of these composers, Carl Frühling and Robert Kahn were Jewish. They suffered persecution later on in life after the Nazis came to power in the early 1930s. Both died in relative obscurity as a result – Frühling in Vienna in 1937 and Kahn much later in the UK after having emigrated to the UK in 1939.

In the first of Steven Isserlis's two concerts here in 2025 in the lead-up to JdP's 30th anniversary, the great British cellist is offering a programme of predominantly Russian music, including two powerful and moving cello sonatas originally composed for Rostropovich. Kabalevsky's Sonata, undeservedly neglected in the West, received its premiere in Moscow in 1963, with composer taking the piano part. It contrasts an electrifying rhythmic energy with passages of veiled lyricism, the second movement even suggesting at times a ghostly 'dance macabre'. Prokofiev's Sonata was composed a year after the composer had been denounced at the Zhdanov conference in February 1948, and is characteristically wry and balletic. The concert also contains a work by Steven's grandfather, Julius Isserlis. A pianist and composer born in Russia, Julius Isserlis responded to the Bolshevic Revolution by emigrating first to Austria and then to Britain.


