You will each have a £60 book allowance from college to help towards buying new course text books once you have arrived in Oxford (receipts are required); the 2nd year medical students will often also have second-hand copies to sell you (though check with your Tutor on arrival whether a particular edition is out-of-date).

There is no need to read anything before you come here but you could, of course, start reading the introductory textbooks. This is not a requirement and you will have no disadvantage during the course if you do not read the books beforehand.
